HIGHLIGHTS OF RICHARDSON, TEXAS REUNION

July 2010

Dear Annuitants, Sons, Daughters, Friends and Guests,

The 40th Annual Creole Reunion was just concluded in Richardson, Texas at the HYATT Regency North Dallas Hotel. Only 176 former associates, friends and guests attended this reunion, among those were about 70 sons and daughters. This is the third year of a lower attendance. This trend is of concern; Corpus 183, and Kissimmee 230.

The Creole Annuitants Association contract with the HYATT – Richardson, dated June 29, 2009 contracted for 432 room nights. No penalty is assessed if 80% or 346 room nights are used. We used 272 room nights. We were short 74 room nights. This shortage made us liable for \$7,286 (74 x \$99). The HYATT relaxed their contractual right so no additional charges were made. Remember, Hal Siegele signed the contract last year and was personally liable if we didn't pay. This trend and the outlook for 2011, was discussed at Saturday's business meeting.

The attendance at this year's reunion was disappointing and a continuation of the decline mentioned above. This seems to be a reflection of many factors: we are an aging group, we have family commitments, health problems, and as well as other competing activities. So adding to the economic conditions of today, terrible air travel conditions and long car drives, fewer people are attending our reunions. Also, last year's swine flu, and border problems with Mexico, etc. certainly didn't help.

The contract with the hotel is usually signed a year ahead of the reunion, so with the low attendance we are considering changing the reunion dates. In the past the best hotel room rates, etc. were the week before or after Memorial Day. So with this in mind, we are taking this opportunity to request new offers for the first week in May, and the first weeks in June at the Las Vegas hotels, to see what kind of a deal can be made. Week-end rates are higher than mid-week so we reconsidered which days of the week we schedule the reunion to keep within our cost guideline.

Think Las Vegas for the 2011 Creole Reunion. We have contracted with the Stratosphere Hotel & Casino. The Stratosphere Las Vegas is located on the Las Vegas Strip, and is highlighted by the 1200 foot tower and observation decks. Our **Reunion is scheduled for MONDAY, June 6, 2011, through THURSDAY, June 9, 2011.** The daily room rate is **\$52.08** (\$39 + 7.50 Fee + 5.58 Tax = \$52.08). Shifting from week-end to mid-week takes advantage of the lower mid-week room rates. The registration letters with all details will be mailed in November 2010.

Mary Siegele and Pat Carrington welcomed people at the registration tables. They were available for answering questions, and pointing out the sign up sheets for banquet seating, etc. This gave them the unique opportunity to meet all attendees. **Clyde (Poggy)**

Pogson who lives in Dallas, was a great help at the reunion in dealing with the hotel, registration, suggesting local attractions such as the Cappuccino's Italian Bistro, etc.

Hospitality Room This year we provided a DVD player and projector in the hospitality room so various Venezuelan pictures could be seen, such as; El Reventon I (1883-1943), El Reventon II (1943-1976), Caracas chronology of the 20th Century, the Stevenson & Liebach 1995 trip to Eastern Venezuela, Doug Becker's family photos in Venezuela and several others. This was a success and we enjoyed sharing the DVD's with others.

For the first time attendees were able to charge drinks to their rooms at the cash bar, in both the hospitality room and at the banquets. The HYATT made an extra effort to make this possible by installing a micro terminal via a long cable to their hotel computer from the bar. The disappointing attendance and reduced bar use made it necessary to reduce the bartenders hours. Also, there were several competing bars; at the swimming pool, hotel Happy Hour from 5 pm to 7 pm when cheaper drinks were served, as well as that in individuals' rooms. This reduced activity made it difficult to reach the \$11,000 food and beverage minimum guarantee in our contract.

Ms. Michole Bedford from the Richardson Convention & Visitors Center was available on Saturday to assist attendees with answers to questions and tours, etc. However, on their own, **Tiny & June Stevenson** and **Evelyn & Herb Leibach** drove over to

Arlington to tour the NFL's newest stadium. This billion dollar, 100,000 seat stadium is the new home of the Dallas Cowboys. The Texas Stadium is a technological marvel that makes Dallas one of the great attractions for sport events. The Super Bowl will be played in this Stadium in 2011.

Mike McKaig provided numerous "History of Oil in Venezuela" hand outs for the attendees' to use in tests their knowledge and memories of Venezuela. This was a wonderful way to enjoy one's many good memories with Mike's challenge of correcting some of our perception of Venezuelan History.

Joanie Miller is asking where you lived ... and fill-in-the-spaces. In other words she is making an effort to obtain the names of all families who have lived in each of the Campo Verde, Tia Juana houses. Joanie's map showing all of the Tia Juana houses was placed in the hospitality room, so attendees' could note their names by each house where they had lived.

The Panera Bread Bakery Café was just a quick jaywalking stride across Campbell Street in front of the hotel. This was a friendly neighborhood restaurant, great for timely visits, delicious sandwiches, salads, and fresh baked rolls, coffee, etc.

ExxonMobil Shareholders Meeting was attended by: Pat Carrington, Virgil Haney, Ron & Astrid Jackson, Bill Kirk, Arnaldo Salazar, Jerry Sanderson, Hal & Mary Siegele, Tiny & June Stevenson, Janet Uribe, Marilynne Urquhart, June Wepsala and Fred Wilson. It was an interesting experience arriving in downtown Dallas in a white stretched Hummer Limousine at the Morton Meyerson Symphony Center, on one side of the street and a group of demonstrators on the other side. An Exxon representative met the Creole group on arrival to escort us into the Center and to our reserved seating (third row center). It was interesting viewing the many lobby displays and accepting the many gifts of; hand calculators, flash drives, glasses, tire pressure gauges, etc. Several of the Exxon executives were in the lobby to meet shareholders, so we were able to chat with Mr. Humphreys our Friday banquet speaker.

Mr. Tillerson, Chairman and CEO of ExxonMobil conducted the annual meeting, giving a Corporate Overview of the 2009 strong results during a year of significant challenges. He pointed out that during the global economic downturn of the past year; ExxonMobil continued to lead the industry worldwide.

There were 10 Shareholder Proposal Items each of which the Board for various reasons, recommended voting against, and all were defeated. However, among the more interesting observations at the meeting were the various shareholder organizations making the proposals such as; "Wetlands Restoration Policy" by the Presbyterian Church (USA) Pension Plan, "Report on Energy Technology" by the Province of St. Joseph of the Capuchin Order, Milwaukee, WI, "Greenhouse Gas Emissions Goal" by Sisters of St. Dominic of Caldwell, New Jersey, and "Planning Assumptions" by Ms. Neva Rockefeller, New York, NY, a great, great, granddaughter of Mr. John D. Rockefeller.

On Friday evening, 108 people attended the banquet. The culinary selections were a Chef's Garden Salad, Stuffed Airline Chicken with Prosciutto and Fontina Cheese with Lemon Dill Beurre, and seasonal vegetables, baked rolls, dessert, coffee and tea.

Mr. Donald D. Humphreys, Senior Vice President and Treasurer of Exxon Mobil Corporation was the evening speaker. A native of Tulsa, Oklahoma, Mr. Humphreys earned a Bachelor of Science in Industrial Engineering and Management from Oklahoma State University in 1971. He served in the U.S. Army from 1972-1974. He obtained an M.B.A. from the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania before joining Exxon Chemical Company in 1976. In 1986, after several assignments in Houston, Baton Rouge and Baytown, he transferred to Exxon Corporation in New York as Senior Financial Advisor in the Controller's Department. In 1988, he moved to Exxon Company, International as Financial Reporting Manager and later served as General Auditor. In 1990, Humphreys became Upstream Controller of Exxon Company, U.S.A.

In 1993, he moved to Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, as Financial Director of the Exxon companies in Malaysia. Humphreys became an Assistant Treasurer of Exxon Corporation in January 1997 and was elected Vice President and Controller in July 1997.

Concurrent with the merger with Mobil in 1999, Humphreys was named Vice President and Controller of Exxon Mobil Corporation. In July 2004, he was named Vice President and Treasurer of Exxon Mobil Corporation. He was elected Senior Vice President and Treasurer and also joined the Corporation's Management Committee effective January 1, 2006.

Mr. Humphreys expressed how it was a pleasure to be with us. Stepping from the podium, and using several charts, he spoke while walking among the audience sharing an overview of the company's 2009 performance and first quarter 2010 results.

ExxonMobil's 2009 results demonstrated again the strength of our business model and our ability to excel under even the most challenging economic conditions. We confirmed once again that we are committed to a long-term vision of investing with discipline, improving operational efficiency, and increasing shareholder value.

Results ... ExxonMobil delivered strong results during a year of significant challenges. We have the Industry-leading safety performance. Exxon Mobil delivered \$19.3 billion in earnings. Cash flow from operations and asset sales was \$30 billion. Capital and Exploration Expenditures (CAPEX) was \$27 billion. A total distribution to shareholders was \$26 billion, and Return on average Capital Employed (ROCE) was 16%.

Return on Capital Employed ... The 2009 return on capital employed continued to lead industries across all business segments and the upstream and downstream and chemical strength of the integrated portfolio consistent execution of a business model and disciplined investment through the business cycles.

Shareholder Returns ... ExxonMobil delivers industry-leading, long-term value to our shareholders over our peers (BP,RDS, CVX) as well as the S&P 500 Index.

Safety ... We achieved the lowest lost time incident rates for our combined employees and contractor workforce in 2009. ExxonMobil has the lowest lost time accident rate and best safety performance and continues to lead the industry. **Our vision is that nobody gets hurt.** We have a commitment to maintain and improve our performance. We continue to believe that an unrelenting emphasis on safe operations by our employees and contractors delivers superior business results.

Corporate Citizenship ... Environmental performance and our continuing investments in education are two examples of our commitment to good corporate citizenship. We had a strong environmental performance in 2009, upstream hydrocarbons flaring down 23% versus 2008. Greenhouse gas emissions down 3 million metric tons versus 2008. \$350 million invested in Education since 2005. Over \$31 million invested to date in the Women's Economic Opportunity Initiative. Committed \$125 million to support the National Math and Science Initiative.

Upstream Highlights ... We maintained our industry leading earnings position, delivered superior returns, and added profitable items to our resource base. Earnings \$17.1 billion. ROCE 23.4%. Production volumes (MOEBD) 3.9. Resource adds 2.9 BOEB. Proven reserves adds 2.0 BOEB. CAPEX \$20.7 billion. Also delivered eight major start-ups including the Adriatic LNG terminal in Italy.

Downstream highlights ... ExxonMobil delivers industry-leading downstream ROCE. Earnings \$1.8 billion. ROCE 7%. Refining throughput and MBD 6.4. Petroleum Products Sales and MBD 6.4. Capex \$3.2 billion. Had the Fujian Refinery and Fujian Chemical Plant. start-up. Fujian is China's first integrated refining and petrochemical facility with foreign participation.

Chemical Highlights ... Exxon Mobil chemical financial performance exceeded our major chemical competitors. One of the three largest chemical companies in the world. Earnings \$2.3 billion. ROCE 13.9%. Sales volume 24.8 MT. Capex \$3.1 billion. Our major chemical growth projects investment was to maximize returns through a unique combination of advantage feeds, low-cost processes, and premium products such as the Singapore Expansion.

Energy Demand to 2030 ... Global energy demand is expected to grow almost 35% by 2030 led by economic progress in developing nations even with large efficiency gains. Global energy mix will remain relatively stable to 2030; also fossil fuels continue to provide about 80% of the worlds' energy. We expect strong growth in natural gas driven by power generation, and energy savings in 2030 about twice the growth in projected energy use.

Share Purchases ... In 2009 we distributed \$18 billion to shareholders through share purchases. \$119 billion distributed over the last five years thus reducing shares outstanding by 26% since the beginning of 2005. This is an effective way to distribute value for shareholders.

Value per Share ... Earnings-per-share is enhanced by our share purchase program.

In 2009 EPS \$3.98 per share makes EPS 44% higher than without share purchases that are an ongoing benefit to all shareholders.

In Summary ... Global energy demand continues to grow. The future of energy is directly linked to the well-being and prosperity of the world's people around the world. More people are seeking access to energy and the economic and social progress it enables. Population and economic growth -- particularly in developing countries -- are expected to boost global demand for energy higher by almost 35% by 2030 compared to 2005. New technologies -- in areas like medicine, computing, and personal communications -- are creating new demands for energy while other technologies are enabling us to use energy more efficiently and less environmentally negative impact. New energy sources are also emerging.

Looking forward we see a dual challenge. Providing energy to meet growing needs while protecting the environment requires an integrated set of solutions. We believe the most effective way to address these intertwined challenges over the long-term is to seek integrated solutions focused on expanding supplies, increasing efficiency, and reducing emissions. Looking to the future, ExxonMobil realizes the scale of this global challenge is enormous, but so, too, is your commitment to succeed and our capacity to innovate. We are confident that by pursuing these integrated solutions, the world can achieve greater energy security, environmental progress and economic prosperity.

Mr. Humphreys presentation provided information to us on the performance of the ExxonMobil Corporation. He took several questions from the audience.

As a thank you gift a silver necklace was presented to Mrs. Humphreys. And, both Mr. & Mrs. Humphreys were made honorary members of our Creole Annuitant Association, and presented with a Creole Petroleum Company stock certificate copy.

Saturday Morning Business Meeting

Virgil, presented a special thank you card to Hal and Mary for their outstanding job as leader of your committee for these many years.

Several complementary comments were made regarding the delicious Friday night banquet meal. The good news is that later, many people also made good comments about Saturday's banquet food. Food remains one of the great enjoyments of modern life, as we all enjoy the sensory pleasure of good food and good company; Banquets are planned as a central social event at each reunion.

This was our 40th reunion. Participation in the banquets is encouraged as a way of making this annual Creole Annuitants Reunion possible.

Committee Business

As background, I hope you all will realize that the Committee makes contracts with hotels a year ahead with attendance estimates based on the current year's experience. Remember, due to the disappointing attendance and unused hotel rooms in Corpus Christi we owed the Omni Hotel for \$7,497 for 63 unused rooms. This debt was cancelled.

In Corpus, after discussion about how to attract more people to the reunions, we thought if it was held in a central place, such as; the Dallas & Ft. Worth area, the 2010 reunion would attract a larger number of people. So by a show of hands, the majority voted for the Dallas/Ft. Worth area in 2010, and going to Las Vegas in 2011.

Bill Walton, who lives in Dallas, provided on site dealings with the hotels and helping to finalize our June 29, 200, contract with the Hyatt Regency North Dallas Hotel, of Richardson.

The Richardson attendance of 176 was down, from the 183 in Corpus, and 230 in Kissimmee. We held the reunion at this central location expecting a larger participation. This did not happen. We used only 272 room nights so were short 74 room nights and had the \$7,286 obligation mentioned earlier.

The lack of reunion participation makes it difficult to know what number of room nights to propose a year ahead of time, to avoid penalty costs when dealing with hotels to obtain reasonable results. This is a pesky, difficult, and complicated problem but there is an answer.

This is an excellent, successful and popular program over the past 20 years, where 97 co-workers and guests have been sponsored to join us at our Creole reunions.

Mr. Arnaldo Salazar, President of the Amigos Creole Group in Caracas, was the evening's speaker. He earned his BS in Mining from the Missouri School of Mines, He started with Creole as a petroleum engineer Creole in 1963. Arnaldo had many managerial positions and was named to the Board of Directors of Petroleos de Venezuela (PDVSA) and retiring in 1994.

On January 1, 1976 Lagoven took the place of Creole and then Arnaldo had eight high level managerial jobs with Lagoven. Western Division: Production Superintendent, Operations Manager, Technical Manager. A move back to QQ carried through the eight as the Eastern Division Manager. Then finally to Caracas for the following corporate jobs Production Assistant Manager, Integral Protection Manager, Production National Manager. His last job with Lagoven was in as a member of the Board of Directors. In 1990 he was named to the Board of Directors of Petroleos de Venezuela and retired in 1994. He was a director for Ferrominera, a Director for Inelekta, Vice President then General Manager for Inelekta. Since then he also has been a consultant.

Mr. Salazar began his talk by pointing out the many Amigos Creole activities in Caracas over the past 10 years (2000-2010). These were listed as:

- 2 Establishing regional branches in Maracaibo and the BCF,

And, establishing the "Notiamigos" newsletter with over 500 subscribers that provide updated news about "Creole" people.

The current Venezuelan Oil Industry situations were discussed and among the many things pointed out were how companies are now being partnered with PDVSA the state company. Also, how the Southern Monagas Orinoco belt region with important gas discoveries is more important making this oil & gas reserves the largest outside the Middle East.

In reviewing today's general situations in Venezuela it was pointed out the economic slump resulted from falling oil output, lower supplies of electricity, water shortages, food shortages, price controls and higher crime rates.

In the hopes for the future in Venezuela it was pointed out that the Congressional elections are in four months, on September 26th, and the presidential elections in December 2012.

The crystal ball is still not clear, but we remain optimistic about Venezuela.

In closing, Mr. Salazar provided a short picture tour of many familiar sites in a series of pictures showing some of Creole/Lagoven facilities and some of Venezuela's outstanding beautiful natural scenes. These pictures brought back memories as we identified each picture. Carretera Viejo de La Guraira, Aeropuerto Grano de Oro, Maracaibo, Oficinas de Creole Petroleum Maracaibo, Maracaibo Club, Hospital Coromoto, La Chinita Puente sobre el Lago, Oficinas La Salina, La Salina Area, Campo Creole, Tia Juana Country Club, Catatumbo, Restaurnt Luigi, Amuay, Plaza Venexuela 1950 y 2002, Cerro El Avila Hotel Humboldt, Chuao 1970, Salto Angel y El Observador Creole.

Pardon my short speech and thanks for your attention. We shall see you next year.
